Handbells as they are known in Europe and the United States are descendants from the tower bells in England. Around the 16th Century, the art of tower bell ringing was becoming established in England. It took hours of practice of pulling on the ropes to create intricate melodies called "change ringing". Ringing the tower bells was disturbing to the surrounding villagers, so small bells were developed so the ringers could practice indoors. Eventually, this type of bell ringing became an art in itself. Larger sets of handbells were cast and "tune ringing", or ringing melodies and simple harmonies for festive occasions was developed. Many churches continue this tradition in worship services throughout America and Europe to praise the Lord with music!



We offer both wine and grape juice in Holy Communion: the wine is in the outermost ring of cups, and the grape juice is in the inner rings of cups. Gluten-free bread is offered at the center table.

Children (of any age) who have not professed faith in Christ are encouraged to come forward with their parents to receive a blessing from the pastor or officer.
